Pistol Permit Application Instructions

Effective July 26, 2021, The State of Connecticut has changed the process to apply for a pistol permit. All pistol permit applicants must Pre-Enroll their information to be fingerprinted and application processed.

Applicant must be 21 years of age or older

Please follow these guidelines to apply for your Pistol Permit through the Town of Killingly:

- 1. Pre-enrollment website is: https://ct.flexcheck.us.idemia.io/CCHRSPreENROLL/
- 2. Town of Killingly Service Code is 09A2-C46D.
- 3. All required fields must be completed for process to be complete.
- 4. Application fees for the *Criminal Background* (\$75) and *FBI* (\$13.25) will need to be paid at enrollment.
- 5. An email confirmation containing your **APPLICANT TRACKING NUMBER** will be sent to you. This will need to be printed and brought to your fingerprint location and as a document for your application.
- 6. Complete fingerprint process.

Please bring the following to the Town Manager's Office to process your application:

- 1. Pistol Permit Application (DPS-799C) fully completed and notarized.
- 2. Fingerprint Cards AND a copy of your APPLICANT TRACKING NUMBER.
- 3. VALID State of Connecticut Driver's License / Identification Card with your current Killingly address. Proof of residency (i.e.: copy of lease/mortgage, town tax bill, auto insurance bill) is also required if your current address DOES NOT match your application. Your license MUST have the change of address sticker from the DMV to support change.
- 4. Original Pistol Safety Course Certificate plus 1 copy
- 5. If applicant was in the military, Discharge Papers (DD-214) MUST be provided.
- 6. Original Birth Certificate (or certified copy), a valid Passport and/or Naturalization papers or Resident Alien card.
- 7. Signed FBI Privacy Notice

Your application and fingerprints will be forwarded to Dept. of Emergency Services and Public Protection. The application process takes no less than 8 weeks.

You will be notified by the Town Manager's Office regarding the status of your application via letter.

Fingerprinting can be done at State Police Barracks/Troop D-Danielson for a fee of \$15.00. They can process fingerprinting at the following hours: 7am, 3pm and 11pm. Payment will be ACCEPTED ONLY as *check/money order* made payable to: Treasurer-State of CT.

Agency Privacy Requirements for Noncriminal Justice Applicants

Authorized governmental and non-governmental agencies/officials that conduct a national fingerprint-based criminal history record check on an applicant for a noncriminal justice purpose (such as employment or a license, immigration or naturalization matter, security clearance, or adoption) are obligated to ensure the applicant is provided certain notice and other information and that the results of the check are handled in a manner that protects the applicant's privacy. These obligations are pursuant to the Privacy Act of 1974, Title 5, United States Code (U.S.C.) Section 552a, and Title 28, Code of Federal Regulations (CFR), Section 50.12, among other authorities.

- Officials must provide to the applicant written notification1 that his/her fingerprints will be used to check the criminal history records of the FBI.
- Officials must ensure that an applicant receives, and acknowledges receipt of, an adequate Privacy Act Statement when the applicant submits his/her fingerprints and associated personal information.²
- Officials using the FBI criminal history record (if one exists) to make a determination of the applicant's suitability for the employment, license, or other benefit must provide the applicant the opportunity to complete or challenge the accuracy of the information in the record.
- Officials must advise the applicant that procedures for obtaining a change, correction, or update of an FBI criminal history record are set forth at 28 CFR 16.34.
- Officials should not deny the employment, license, or other benefit based on information in the criminal history record until the applicant has been afforded a reasonable time to correct or complete the record or has declined to do so.
- Officials must use the criminal history record solely for the purpose requested and cannot disseminate the record outside the receiving department, related agency, or other authorized entity.3

The FBI has no objection to officials providing a copy of the applicant's FBI criminal history record to the applicant for review and possible challenge when the record was obtained based on positive fingerprint identification. If agency policy permits, this courtesy will save the applicant the time and additional FBI fee to obtain his/her record directly from the FBI by following the procedures found at 28 CFR 16.30 through 16.34. It will also allow the officials to make a more timely determination of the applicant's suitability.

Each agency should establish and document the process/procedures it utilizes for how/when it gives the applicant notice, what constitutes "a reasonable time" for the applicant to correct or complete the record, and any applicant appeal process that is afforded the applicant. Such documentation will assist State and/or FBI auditors during periodic compliance reviews on use of criminal history records for noncriminal justice purposes.

Noncriminal Justice Applicant's Privacy Rights

As an applicant who is the subject of a national fingerprint-based criminal history record check for a noncrimir justice purpose (such as an application for employment or a license, an immigration or naturalization matter, securi clearance, or adoption), you have certain rights which are discussed below.

- You must be provided, and acknowledge receipt of, an adequate Privacy Act Statement when you subm your fingerprints and associated personal information. This Privacy Act Statement should explain th authority for collecting your information and how your information will be used, retained, and shared. 5
- If you have a criminal history record, the officials making a determination of your suitability for th employment, license, or other benefit must provide you the opportunity to complete or challenge th accuracy of the information in the record.
- The officials must advise you that the procedures for obtaining a change, correction, or update of you criminal history record are set forth at Title 28, Code of Federal Regulations (CFR), Section 16.34.
- If you have a criminal history record, you should be afforded a reasonable amount of time to correct of complete the record (or decline to do so) before the officials deny you the employment, license, or other benefit based on information in the criminal history record.⁶

You have the right to expect that officials receiving the results of the criminal history record check will use it only for authorized purposes and will not retain or disseminate it in violation of federal statute, regulation or executive order, or rule, procedure or standard established by the National Crime Prevention and Privacy Compact Council.7

If agency policy permits, the officials may provide you with a copy of your FBI criminal history record for review and possible challenge. If agency policy does not permit it to provide you a copy of the record, you may obtain a copy of the record by submitting fingerprints and a fee to the FBI. Information regarding this process may be obtained at https://www.fbi.gov/services/cjis/identity-history-summary-checks.

If you decide to challenge the accuracy or completeness of your FBI criminal history record, you should send your challenge to the agency that contributed the questioned information to the FBI. Alternatively, you may send your challenge directly to the FBI. The FBI will then forward your challenge to the agency that contributed the questioned information and request the agency to verify or correct the challenged entry. Upon receipt of an official communication from that agency, the FBI will make any necessary changes/corrections to your record in accordance with the information supplied by that agency. (See 28 CFR 16.30 through 16.34.)
